The CQUIN Learning Network 6th Annual Meeting:

DSD 2.0: The Future of Differentiated Service Delivery

Location: Durban, South Africa **Dates**: December 6-9, 2022

Since the 2017 launch of the HIV Coverage, Quality and Impact Network (CQUIN) in Durban, South Africa, the network has grown into a vibrant, high-impact forum that has made substantive contributions to the scale-up of differentiated HIV service delivery in Africa. Convened by ICAP at Columbia University with support from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and partnerships with the International Treatment Preparedness Coalition and other stakeholders

The CQUIN network is designed to accelerate the scale up of differentiated HIV service delivery (DSD) and to address the barriers between adoption of DSD policies and the implementation of high-quality DSD models at scale. Ministries of Health and recipients of care are key stakeholders, represented on CQUIN's Advisory Board along with the World Health Organization, UNAIDS, the Global Fund, the U.S. President's Emergency Fund for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the US Agency for International Development (USAID) and civil society representatives.

CQUIN activities promote country-to-country learning, diffusion of innovation, community engagement, and co-creation of practical knowledge and tools. CQUIN also provides focused and strategic technical assistance, supports catalytic research projects and *ad hoc* data collection and analysis, seconds national DSD coordinators to Ministries of Health as needed, and supports countries to plan, coordinate, and monitor DSD activities. Since its launch, CQUIN has hosted 19 multi-country workshops, 42 webinars, 33 country-to-country learning visits, and more than 60 country engagement visits. Nine communities of practice are working together to exchange best practices and co-create resources on topics including: differentiated monitoring and evaluation; DSD quality and quality improvement; advanced HIV disease; community engagement in DSD programs; differentiated HIV/TB services; differentiated maternal and child health (MCH) services; differentiated services for key and priority populations; DSD for people with both HIV and NCDs; and DSD for displaced, mobile, and migrant populations.

In 2022, ICAP received additional funding from the Gates Foundation, extending the life of the network through 2027 and expanding its scope to include differentiated testing and linkage, and a more expansive vision of differentiated service delivery – DSD 2.0.

The 6th CQUIN Annual Meeting will return to Durban to celebrate the launch of "CQUIN 2.0". From December 6th – 9th 2022, CQUIN will convene all network countries to share DSD implementation progress, updates, innovations, and challenges and to collaboratively plan a portfolio of 2023 activities and action plans that reflect the future of DSD and enhance the quality and coverage of HIV service delivery. The meeting will also showcase results of the updated CQUIN treatment dashboard and introduce the new differentiated testing and linkage capability maturity model dashboard.

Key Objectives:

- Review member countries' progress towards scaling up high-quality differentiated treatment using the updated CQUIN treatment dashboard, national data, and case studies
- Introduce CQUIN 2.0 priorities, including the new CQUIN testing and linkage dashboard, pilot results, and scale-up plans
- Facilitate exchange of knowledge, best practices, innovations, resources, and strategies for scaling up diverse DSD models (DSDM)
- Highlight achievements and plans for CQUIN communities of practice and discuss differentiated models, best practices, innovations, and resources for specific groups
- Support the development of country action plans and targets for 2023
- Identify common gaps, challenges and opportunities for future joint learning, co-creation of tools and resources and country-to-country exchange visits

Participants:

The 6th annual meeting will bring together approximately 250 people from the 21 CQUIN network countries, the CQUIN Advisory Group, and other global stakeholders. Country teams will include ministries of health, national networks of people living with HIV, donors, development partners, implementing partners, civil society, and academic institutions.

Agenda:

Registration will start on the afternoon of Monday, December 5. The meeting itself will start Tuesday, December 6th and end at 2pm on Friday, December 9th. Presentations will take the form of plenary and panel discussions, parallel sessions, breakout group discussions, and a Tools Lab. A detailed agenda will be shared in advance of the meeting.

Deliverables:

- Updated DSD treatment dashboards for each network member country
- Updated DSD "model mix" data for each network member country, highlighting the proportion of recipients of care in each DSD model
- Country-specific action plans that set priority activities for scaling up differentiated testing, linkage, and treatment in 2023
- Recommendations for joint learning and co-creation of tools
- CQUIN annual meeting website, with slides, recordings, and summary reports
