What is the CQUIN network?

www.cquin.icap.columbia.edu

The HIV **Coverage, Quality and Impact Network** is an African learning network designed to advance HIV differentiated service delivery to enhance recipient of care outcomes and strengthen health systems

- Launched in 2017
- Funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation
- Convened/led by ICAP at Columbia University
- Supported by an Advisory Group inclusive of Ministries of Health, civil society, PEPFAR, CDC, USAID, WHO, Global Fund, UNAIDS, ITPC
- Supported by a Community Advocacy Network chaired by ITPC
- Focuses on the gap between policy and implementation at scale

How does CQUIN work?

- Convenes health system leaders from network countries to participate in joint learning and information exchange, with the goal of fostering the scale-up and spread of high-quality, high-impact HIV services
- Countries join at MOH level. MOH engage a core team, including recipients of care, implementing partners, civil society, donors, academic institutions, etc.
- This country team then:
 - ✓ conducts baseline and periodic self-assessment using **CQUIN capability maturity models**
 - ✓ develops **DSD action plans**, commitments and targets
 - ✓ participates in **network activities** (including communities of practice) via an opt-in demand-driven approach
 - ✓ exchanges knowledge and tools/resources and shares data on progress of scale up, best practices and lessons learned

What is a capability maturity model?

A systems strengthening approach that:

- Identifies **core functions/domains** in which capability is required to achieve organizational goals
- Describes **sequential stages of maturity** within each domain
- Sets a clear path towards achieving maturational goals
- Is **used repeatedly over time** to track change

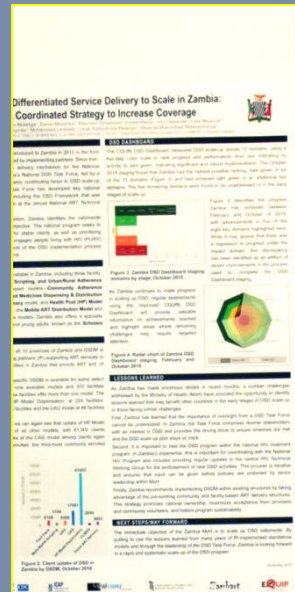
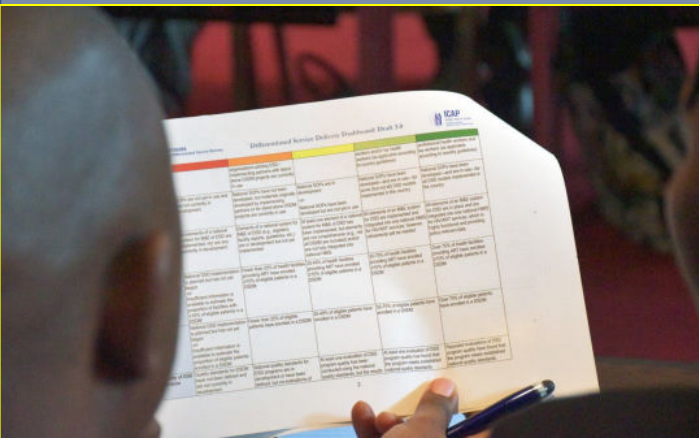
How does CQUIN use CMM Results?

Annual systematic self-assessment of national DSD program maturity by multidisciplinary country teams, including recipients of care

- Compared year-to-year to track maturity of DSD programs over time
- Enables network countries to use the same terms and indicators – helps to identify areas of shared interest and challenges
- Promotes friendly competition and diffusion of innovation
- ICAP's CQUIN team uses results to prioritize network activities
- Country teams use results to prioritize their DSD action plan activities



In CQUIN's 2021 external evaluation, MOH respondents ranked CQUIN's use of capability maturity models as one of the three **highest-impact** elements of the network



DSD Action Plans

Each year at the Annual Meeting, CQUIN country teams develop national DSD action plans which:

- Reflect national priorities
- Align with donor-funded activities (PEPFAR, Global Fund, other)
- Are timed to lead into the PEPFAR COP planning cycle (and this year, into the Global Fund NFM4 planning cycle)

MOHs lead collaborative development with recipients of care, implementers, donors, and other stakeholders

- Action plans are updated throughout the year, including at every CQUIN meeting
- Teams report back on progress at the Annual Meeting

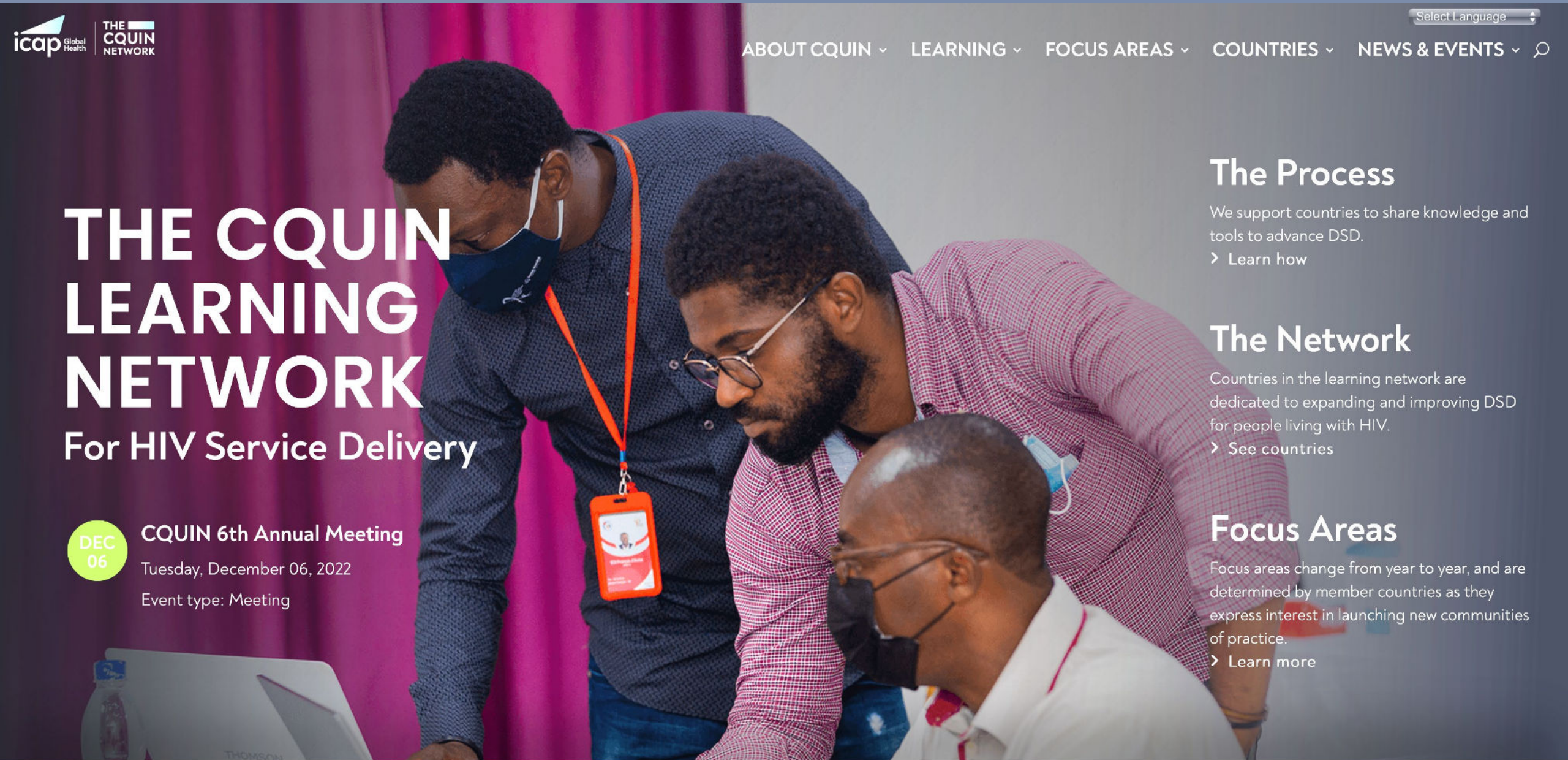

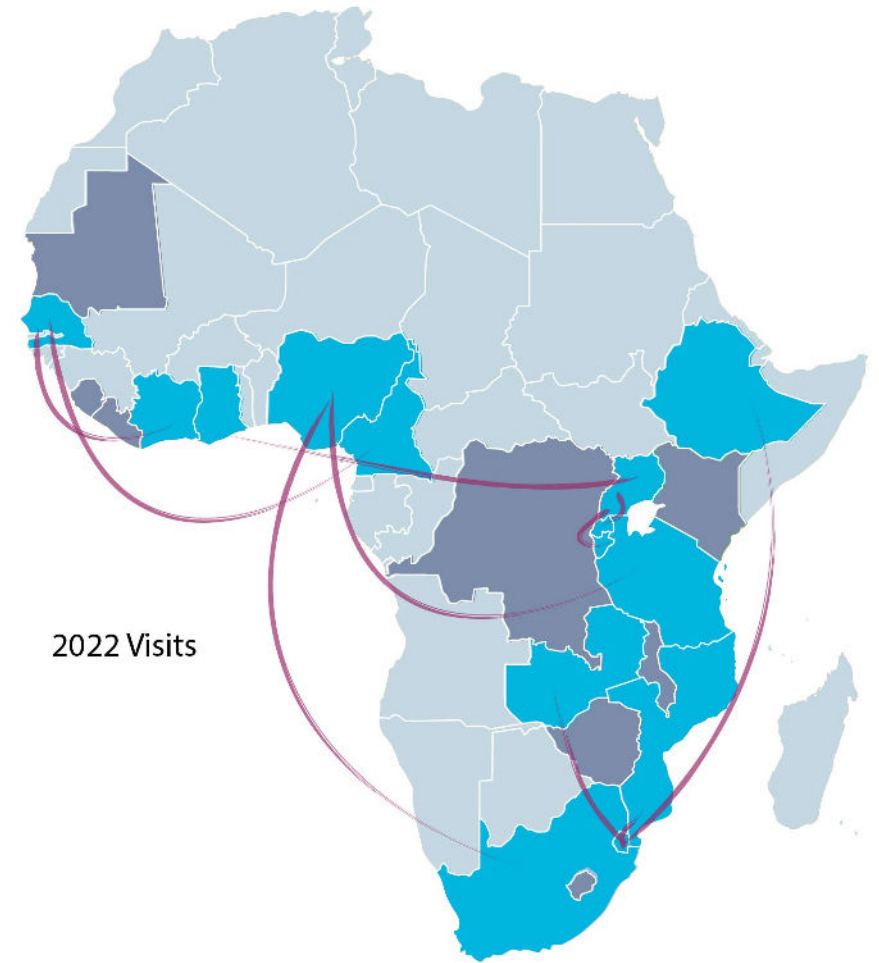

New and Revised Capability Maturity Models

- Revised the differentiated treatment CMM
 - Added domains, reflecting CQUIN's expanded focus
 - Made scoring more rigorous, reflecting the marked progress that countries have made since the original CMM was developed
- Scaled-up the advanced HIV disease (AHD) CMM
 - Has now been used by 14 countries
- Introduced a new differentiated testing and linkage CMM
 - Piloted in 7 countries in 2022

7 Country-to-Country Learning Exchange Visits in 2022

- Ethiopia visited Eswatini for AHD
- Eswatini, Mozambique & Zambia visited Tanzania for KP services
- Tanzania visited Nigeria for Decentralized Drug Distribution (DDD)
- Ghana and Burundi visited Uganda for DDD
- Zambia visited Nigeria for AHD (supported by GF-SI)
- Rwanda visited Uganda for DDD
- Cameroon and Cote d'Ivoire visited Senegal for HIV/syphilis dual testing



Impact of country-to-country exchange visits



- Following the visit to Eswatini, **Ethiopia** developed AHD SOPs & manuals; trained 160 Health care providers and scaled up AHD services to 124 health facilities
- Following the visit to Tanzania, **Mozambique** updated its DSD manual to include KP Prevention package
- Following the visit to Nigeria, **Zambia** adopted VISITECT as a CD4 POC for identifying people with AHD; mapped out hub and spoke model; M&E tools being updated for AHD; and started a phased roll-out of community AHD model to address high post-discharge mortality
- Following the visit to Uganda, **Ghana** has started a phased implementation of DDD with initial pilot in 30 facilities.

Tools/Resources Exchanged in 2022

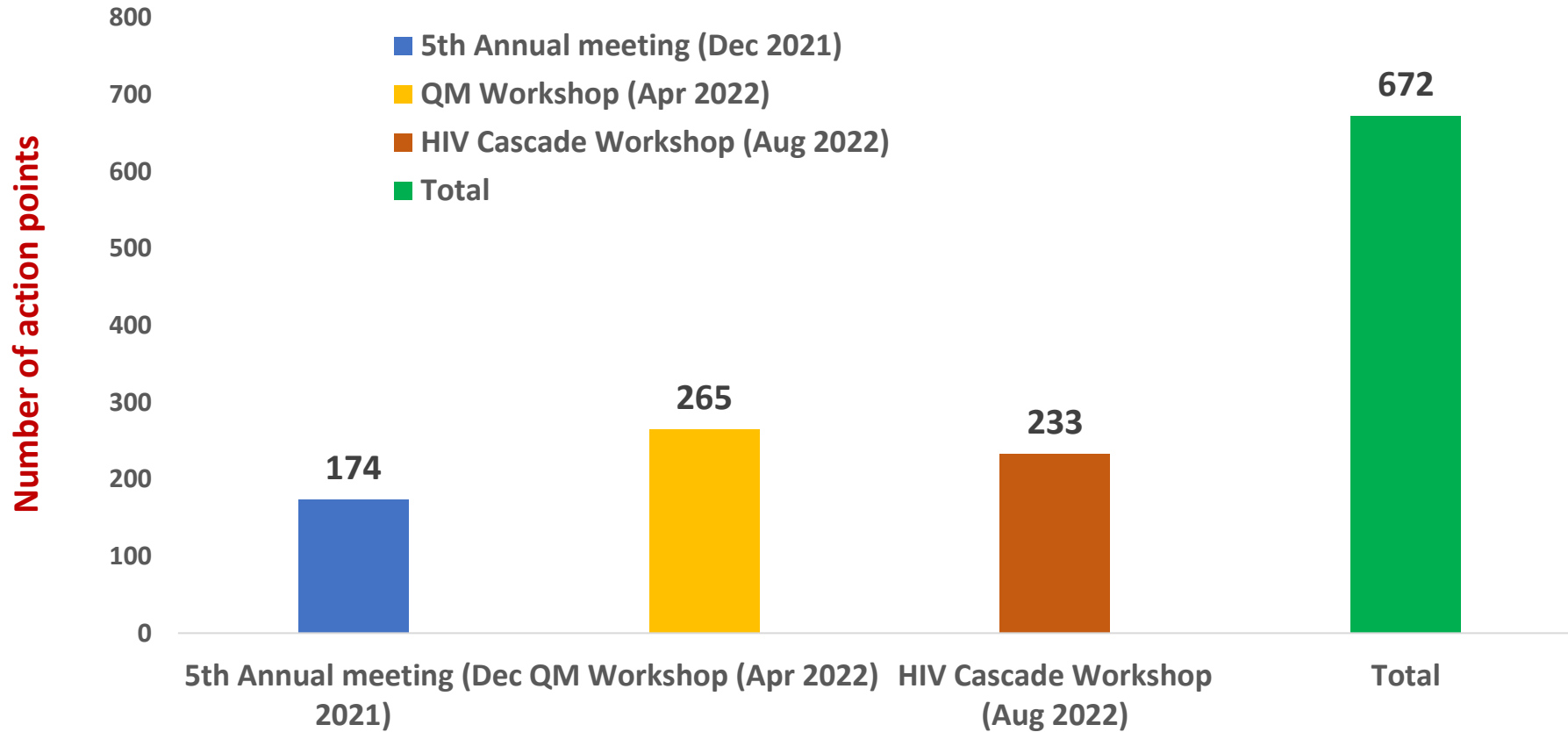
- At least 50 tools and resources were exchanged
- About half were shared in the months following the 5th Annual Meeting
- Most were frameworks and implementation toolkits
- Half were requested through ICAP CQUIN staff, and the other half were requested directly between countries

From Workshopping to Country Action: 19 countries generated 672 action items from the last three CQUIN Meetings

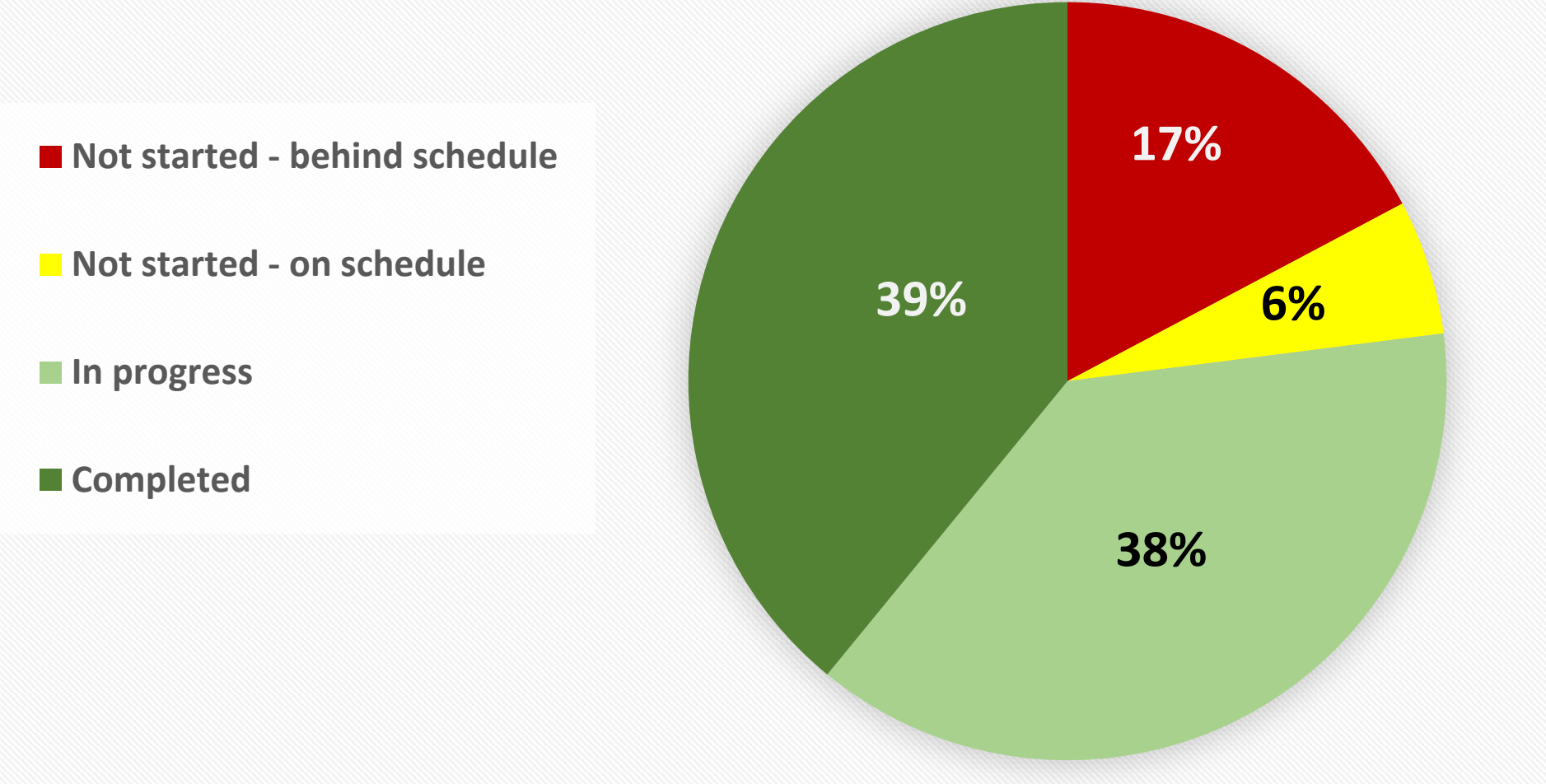


Of the 672 action points: **26%** (174) were from the annual meeting, **39%** (265) from the QM meeting, and **35%** (233) from the Cascade meeting

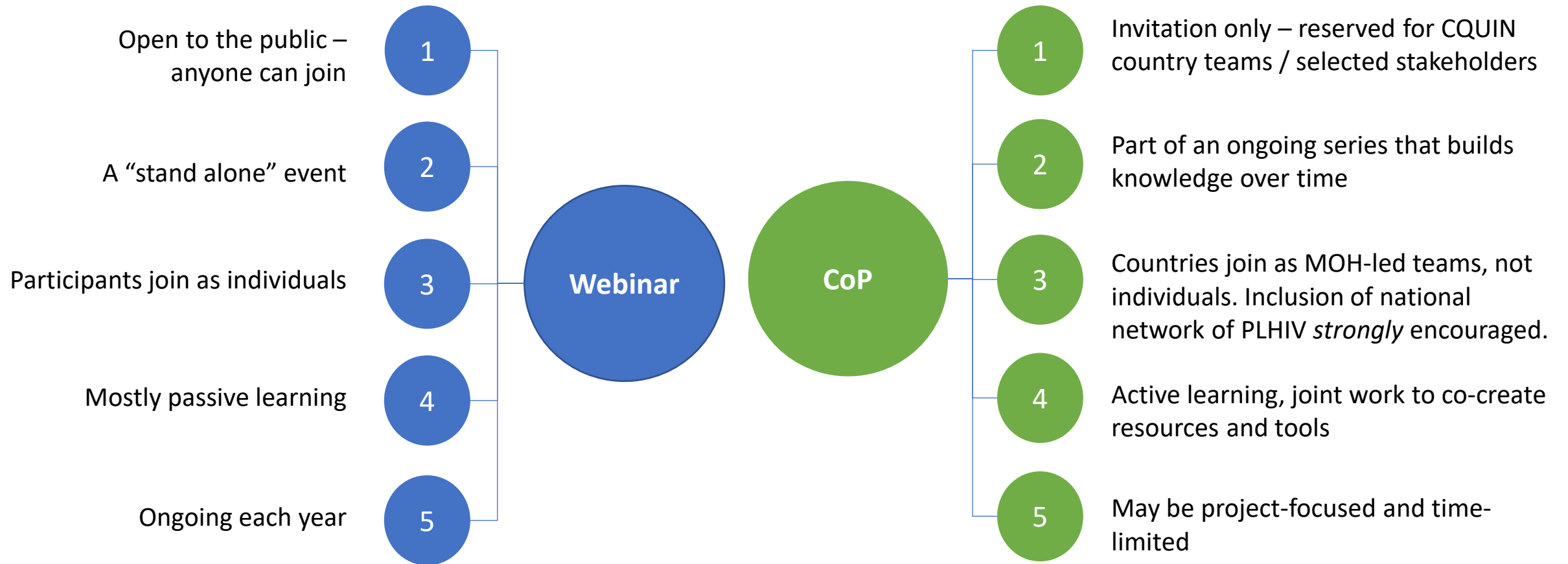
Defining a Community of Practice

Current Country Membership to CQUIN Communities of Practice



- CQUIN re-constituted the CoPs in 2022 following feedback from member countries on changing priorities and expanded interest in joining new CoPs
- **Community Engagement and DSD Coordinators CoPs** are open to all CQUIN member countries
- **Migrant, Mobile and Displaced People** has been on hiatus. Eight countries now interested in restarting activities

Summary of Communities of Practice Technical Areas of Focus

- The **Quality** CoP
 - Scale-up the use of the CQUIN quality management toolkit (with a focus on less intensive DSD models)
 - Broaden the scope of quality standards and indicators beyond less intensive DSD models to include AHD, TPT, MCH/FP, and dHTS
 - Work with the M&E and community engagement CoPs to develop a client satisfaction toolkit
- The **AHD** CoP
 - Scale-up AHD service delivery through a health systems strengthening approach
 - Work with the Quality CoP on quality standards for AHD service delivery
- The **TB/HIV** CoP
 - Optimize the delivery of TB/HIV services to people in DART models
 - Support the integration of TB intensive case finding and TB preventive treatment (TPT) into less-intensive DSD models
- The **M&E** CoP
 - Optimize the use of electronic medical records (EMR) for DSD

Summary of Communities of Practice Technical Areas of Focus

- The **MCH** CoP
 - Family planning integration into HIV care for women living with HIV
 - Differentiated HIV testing and treatment for PBFW and their infants including duo-testing for syphilis and HIV
 - Differentiated MCH service delivery models
- The **KP** CoP
 - Scale-up KP differentiated treatment services
 - Improve the quality and coverage of HIV care and treatment services for KP living with HIV
- The **HIV/NCDs** CoP
 - Incorporate NCD screening, prevention, and treatment services into HIV ART models
- The **Community Engagement** CoP
 - Scale-up the use of the Community Engagement toolkit to CQUIN member countries
 - Develop the Recipient of Care Satisfaction toolkit (in collaboration with the M&E and Quality CoP)
- The **Migrant, Mobile and Displaced People** CoP
 - Previously shared DSD models and case studies from Nigeria, South Sudan and Mozambique
 - To be re-activated in 2023

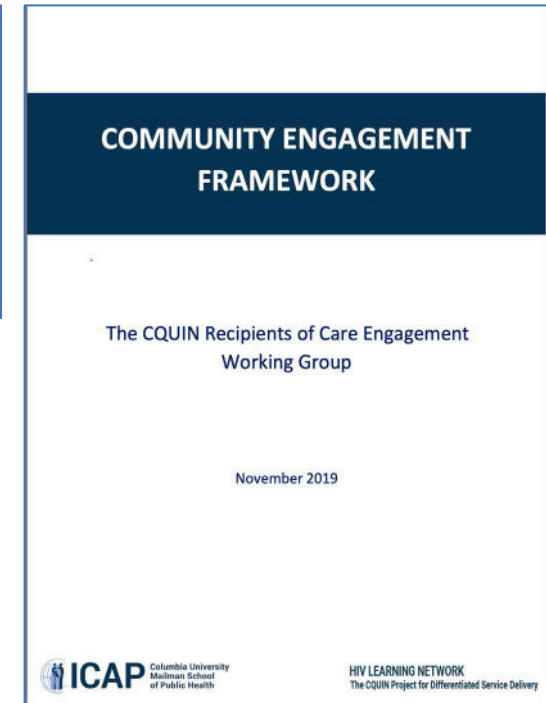

Community of Practice co-created resource: Scaling up the Community Engagement Monitoring Toolkit

- ITPC and ICAP co-convene a Community Advocacy Network (CAN), which evolved out of the CQUIN community of practice on community engagement.
- In 2019 – 2020, ITPC, ICAP, and recipients of care including representatives of national networks of people living with HIV worked together to develop a **conceptual framework for community engagement**.
- In 2020 – 2021 we developed **indicators and tools to assess CE** using the new framework and then piloted an adapted community-led monitoring approach
- In 2022, ITPC supported recipients of care in **19 countries to implement the CE monitoring toolkit**

Data for Decision-making about DSD

- Since 2017, CQUIN stakeholders have characterized the lack of data about DSD implementation as a primary barrier to the scale-up of high-quality differentiated HIV services
 - The Differentiated M&E community of practice was one of the first CQUIN CoPs
 - Still very active in 2022, with 18 participating countries
 - ICAP’s CQUIN team also provides TA to selected MOH to incorporate key DSD indicators into routine M&E systems
- In addition, CQUIN uses two key strategies to assess DSD scale-up at the country and network levels: **Capability Maturity Models** and assessment of **data from implementation**, including:
 - Countries M&E data on **model mix** and **MMD**
 - Data from **DSD Performance Reviews**

“We need to strengthen our M&E system so we can report on DSD models, not just MMD”

“The National M&E system is not able to report on all implemented models”

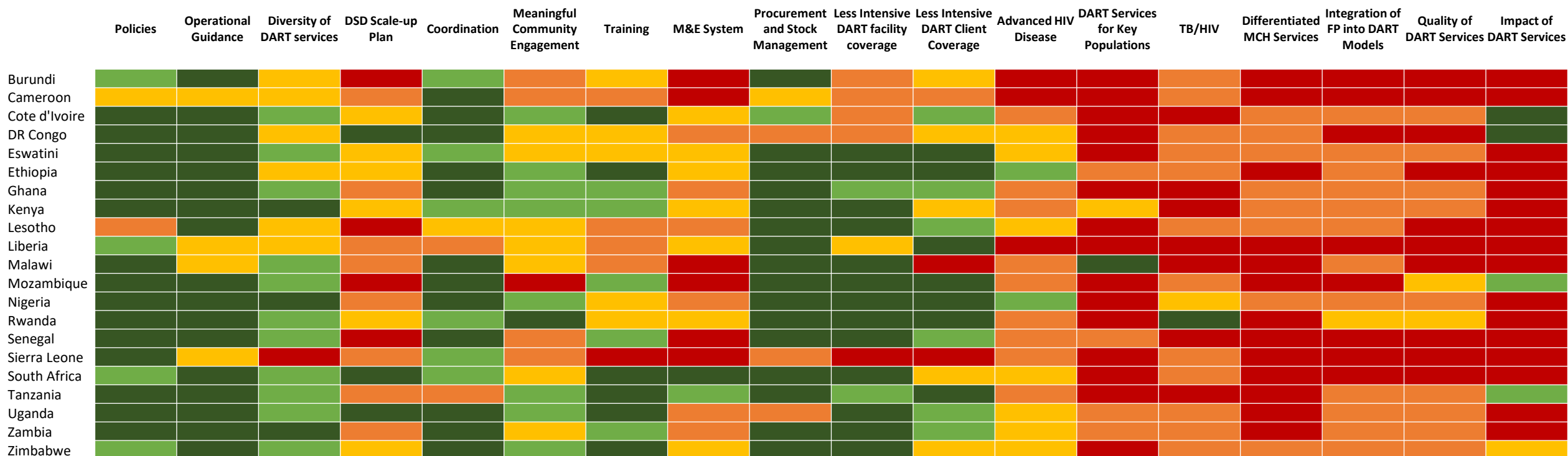

CQUIN's Capability Maturity Model for Differentiated Treatment

- **Initially developed in 2017; minor updates over the years**
 - As noted earlier, describes increasingly mature stages within each domain
 - Provides a common language for network partners to discuss DSD scale-up
- **In 2022, ICAP's CQUIN team led a major revision of the treatment CMM**
 - Jan 2022: Initial draft developed
 - Feb 2022: In-person consultations with MOHs at the Strategic Planning meeting in Nairobi
 - March-May 2022: Revised CMM input from MOH and developed staging toolkit
 - June-July 2022: Piloted revised CMM toolkit with six countries
 - August-September 2022: All CQUIN countries conducted self-staging with the new CMM
- **Rationale: to reflect the changing landscape of DSD and the CQUIN network**
 - Staging = more rigorous, to reflect changing ambitions of network countries
 - Domains = more diverse, to reflect the shift towards “DSD 2.0” and the importance of DSD for specific populations (KP, PBFW) and clinical contexts (AHD, MCH, FP, TB/HIV)

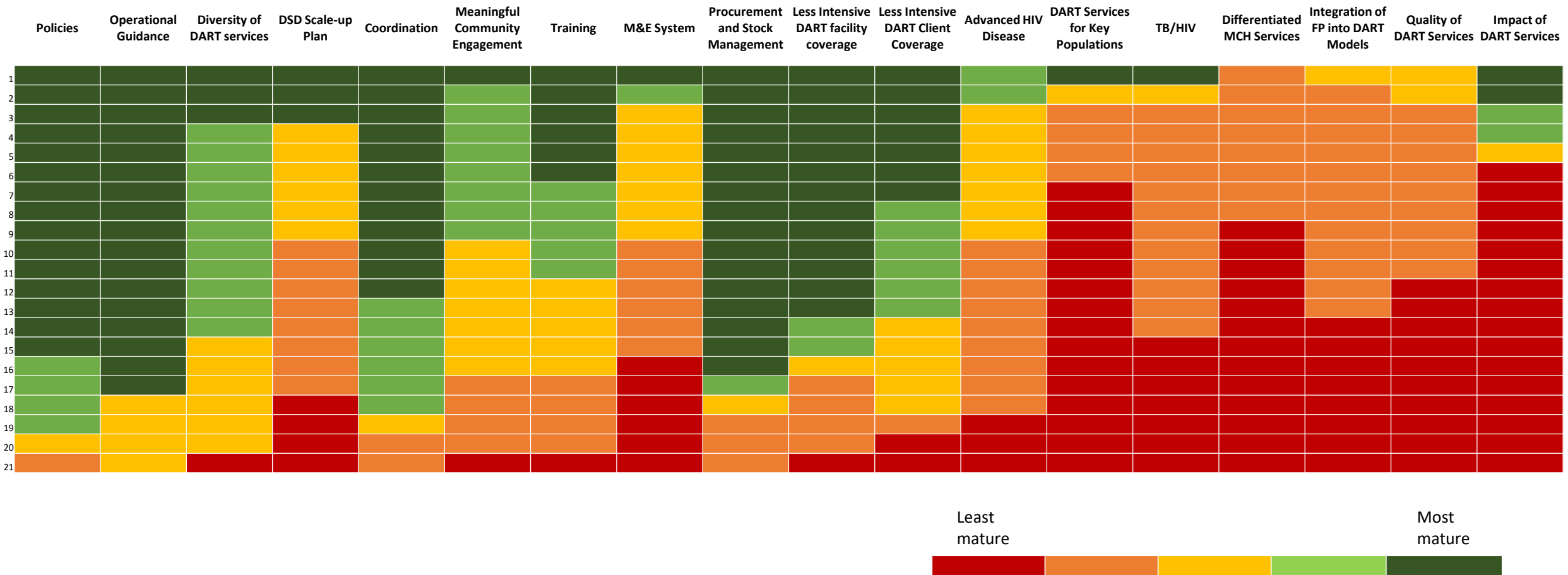
2022 treatment capability maturity model (CMM) results by country



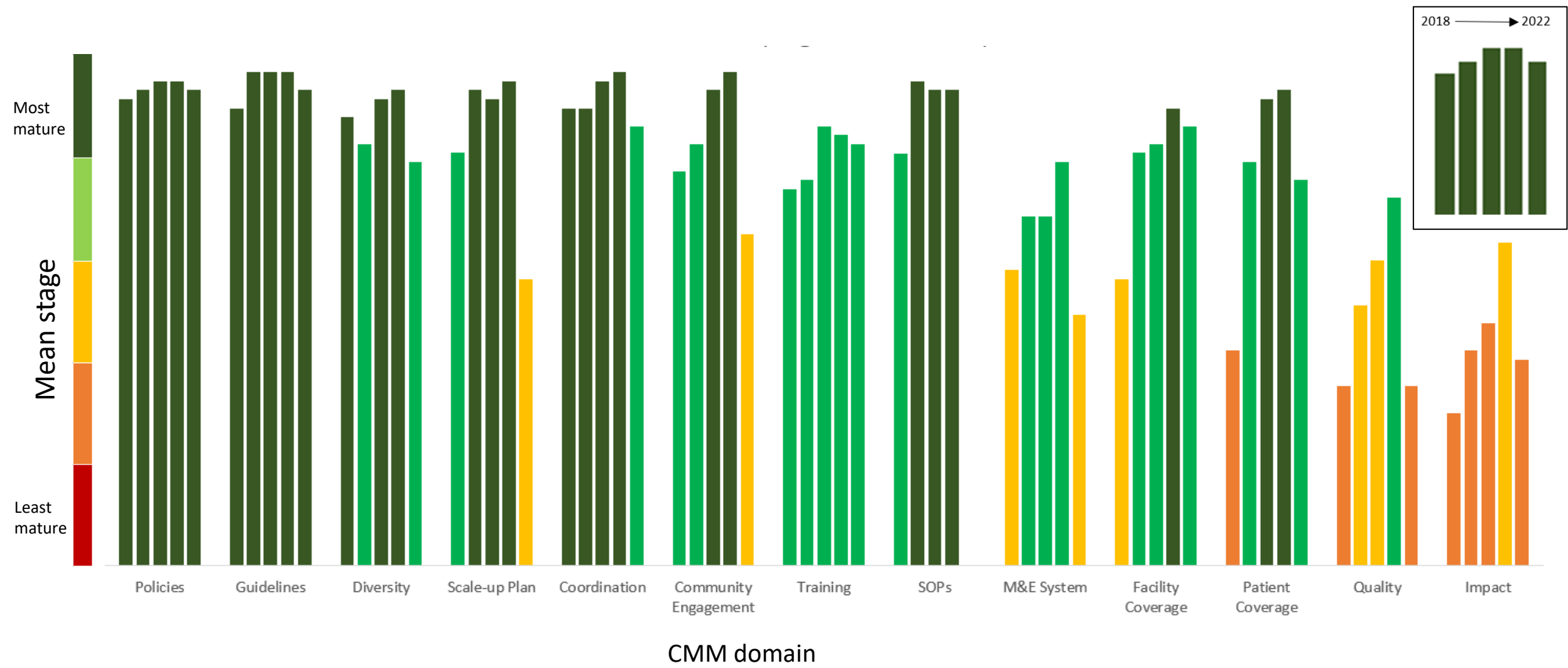
Rows = countries in alphabetical order
 Columns = domains in the 2022 treatment CMM



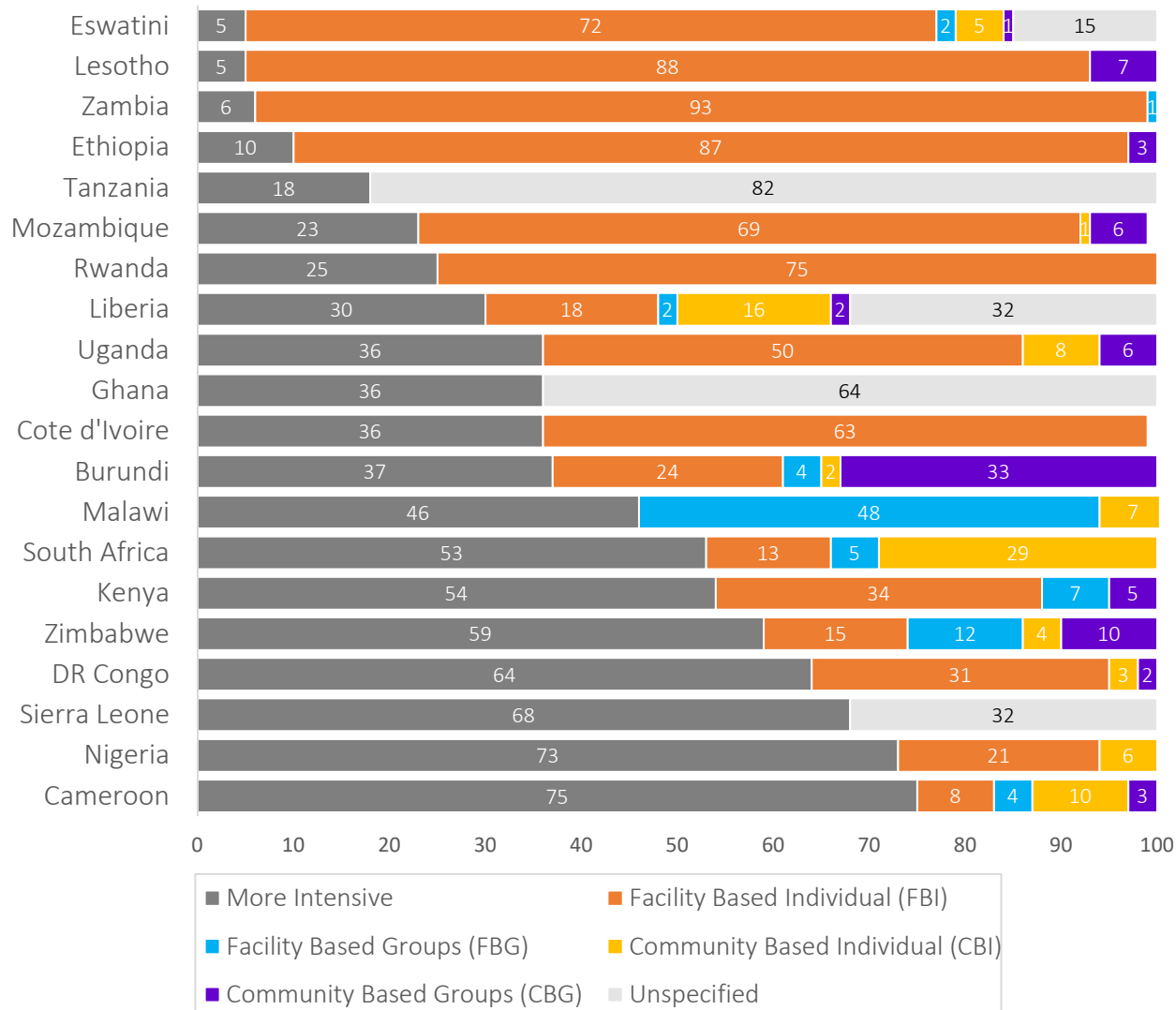
2022 CMM Results: Data stacked by stage



Mean CMM dashboard scores over time, 2018-22, 11 countries active since 2018

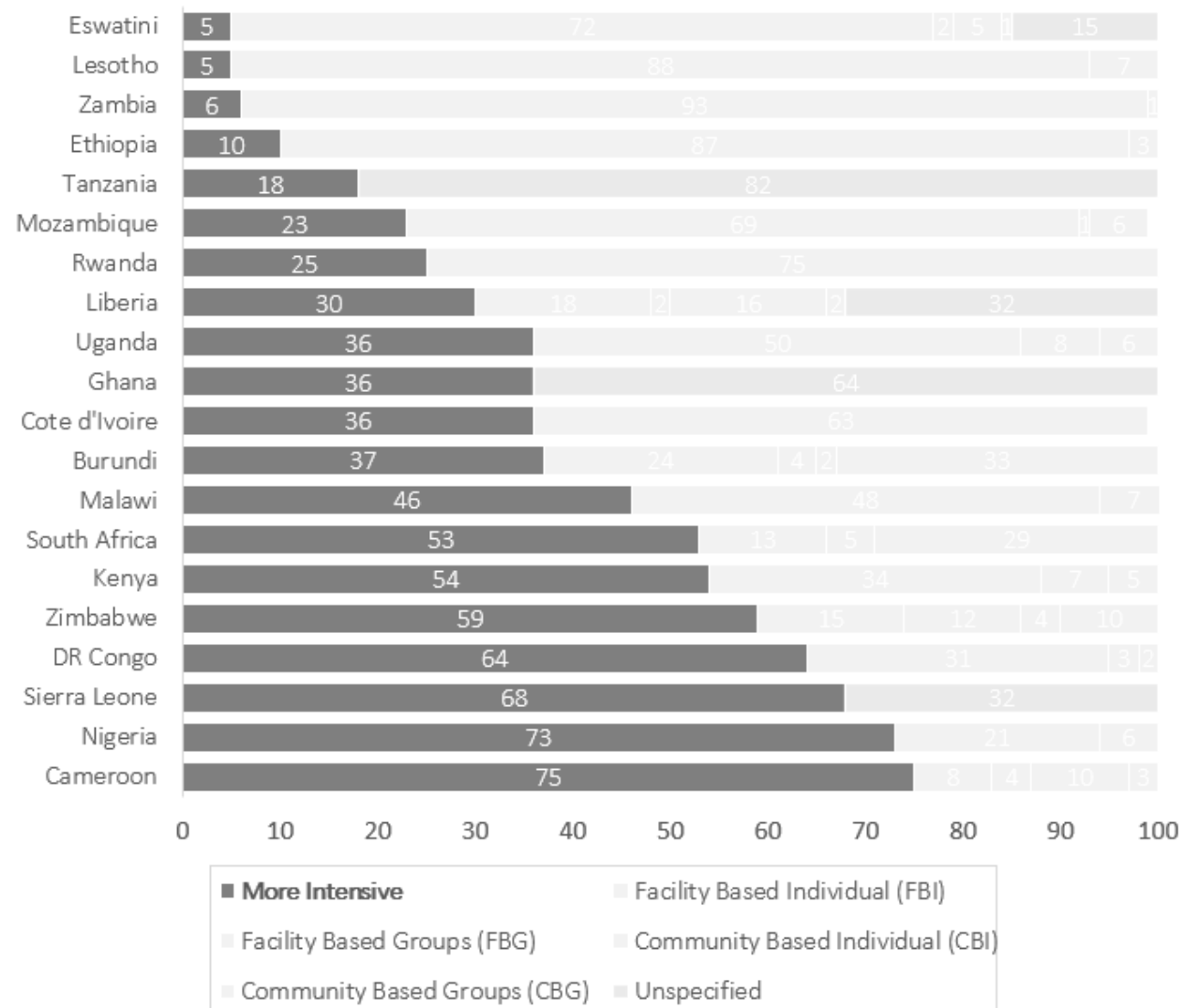


2022 ART model type mix by country*

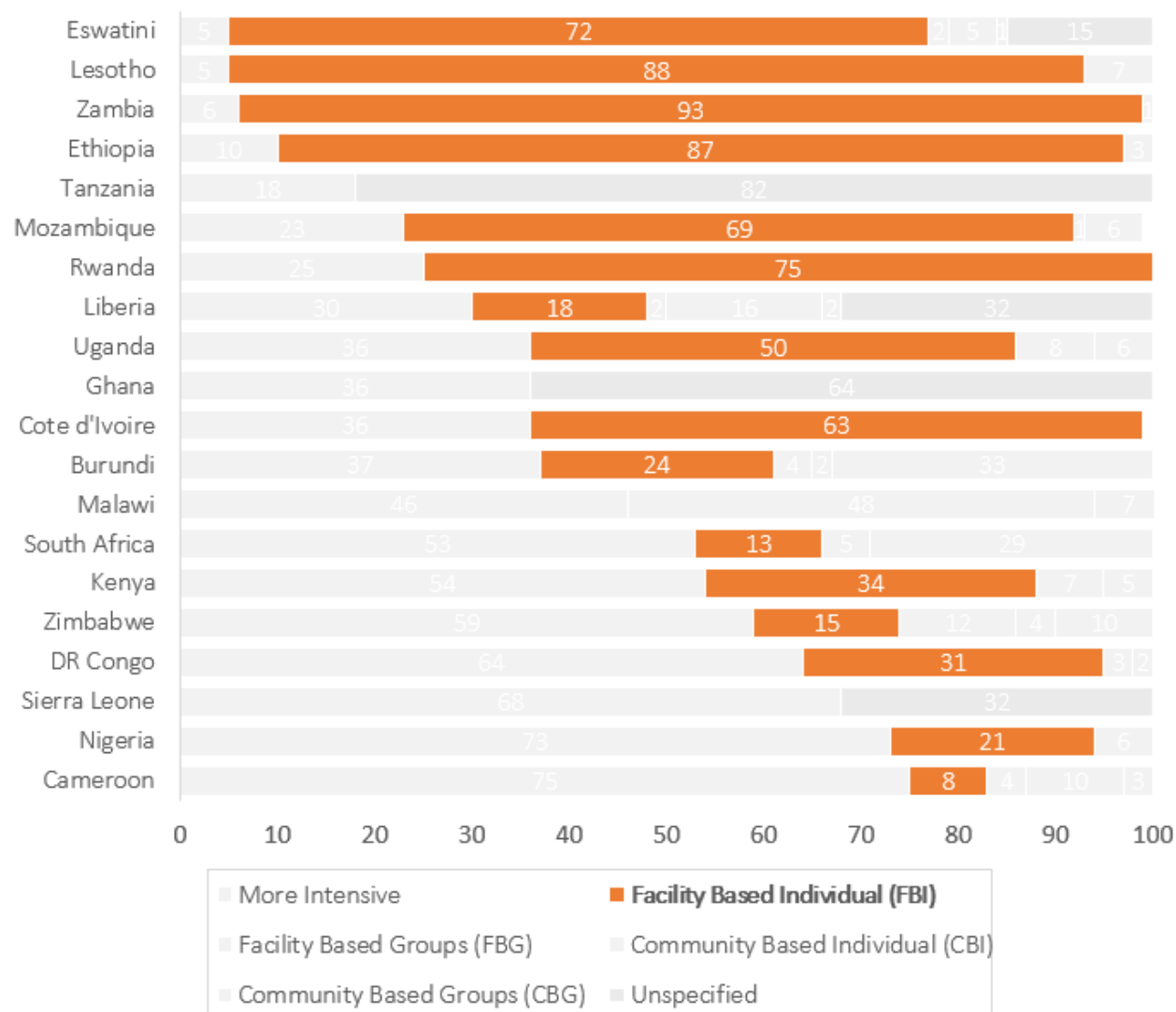

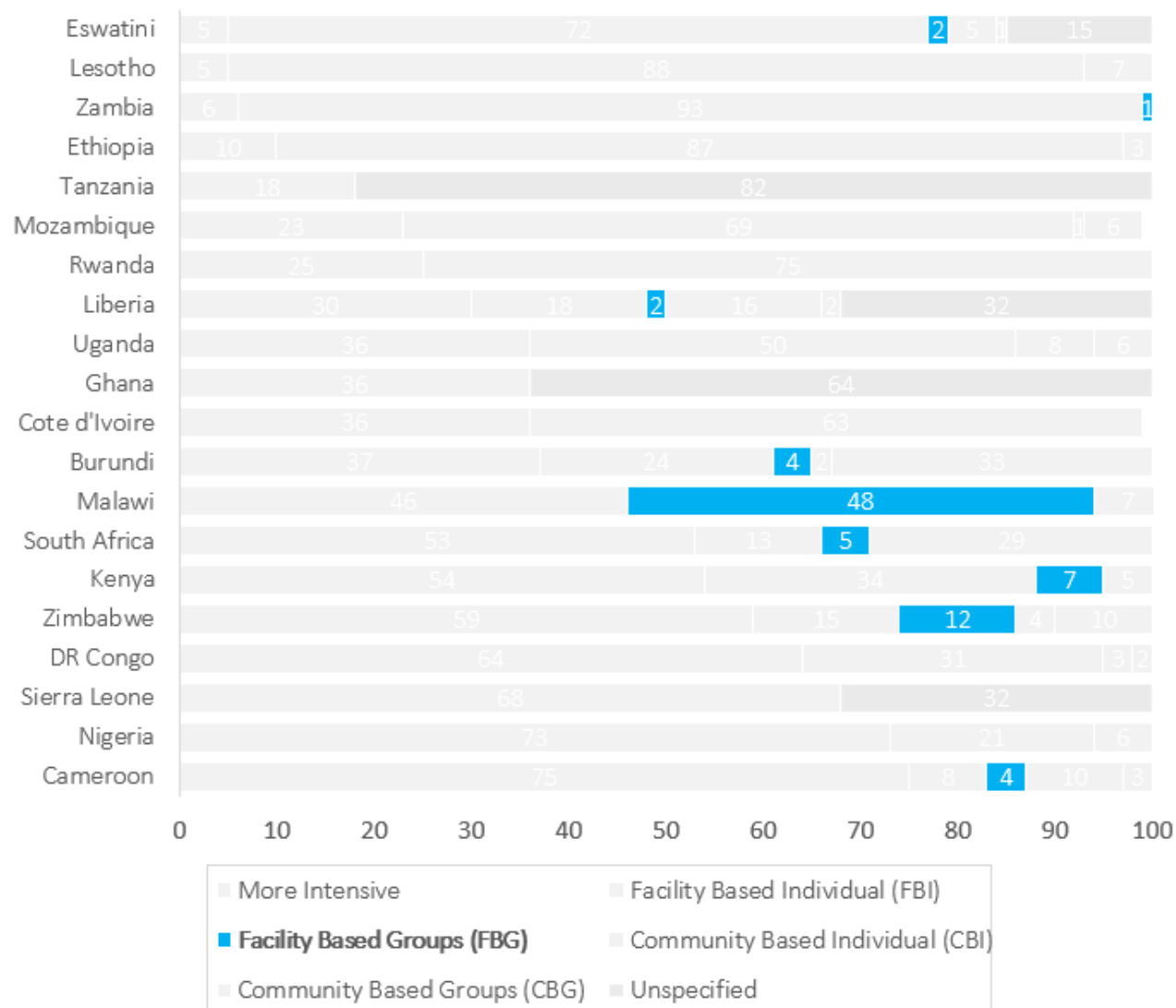
2022 ART model type mix by country



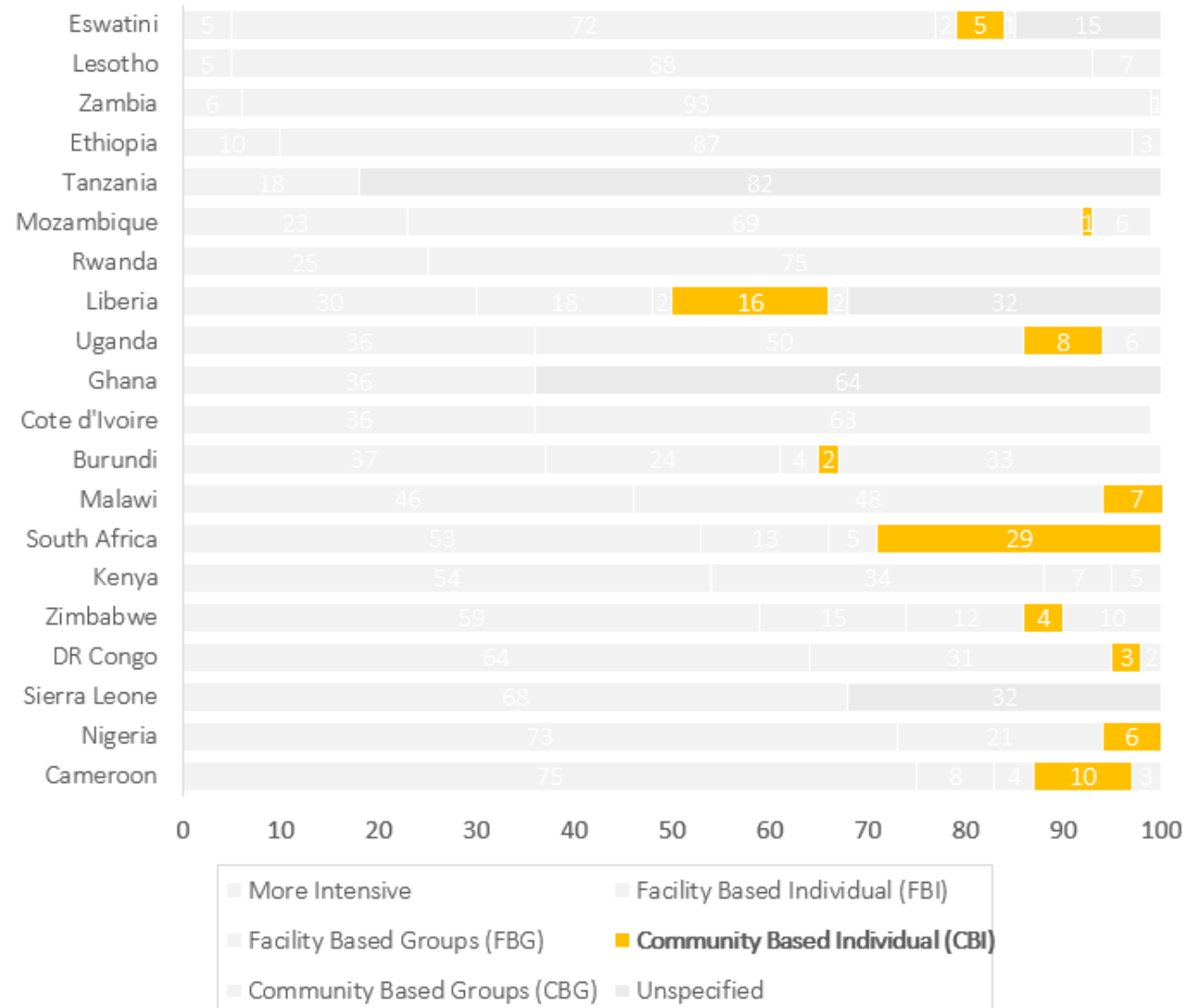

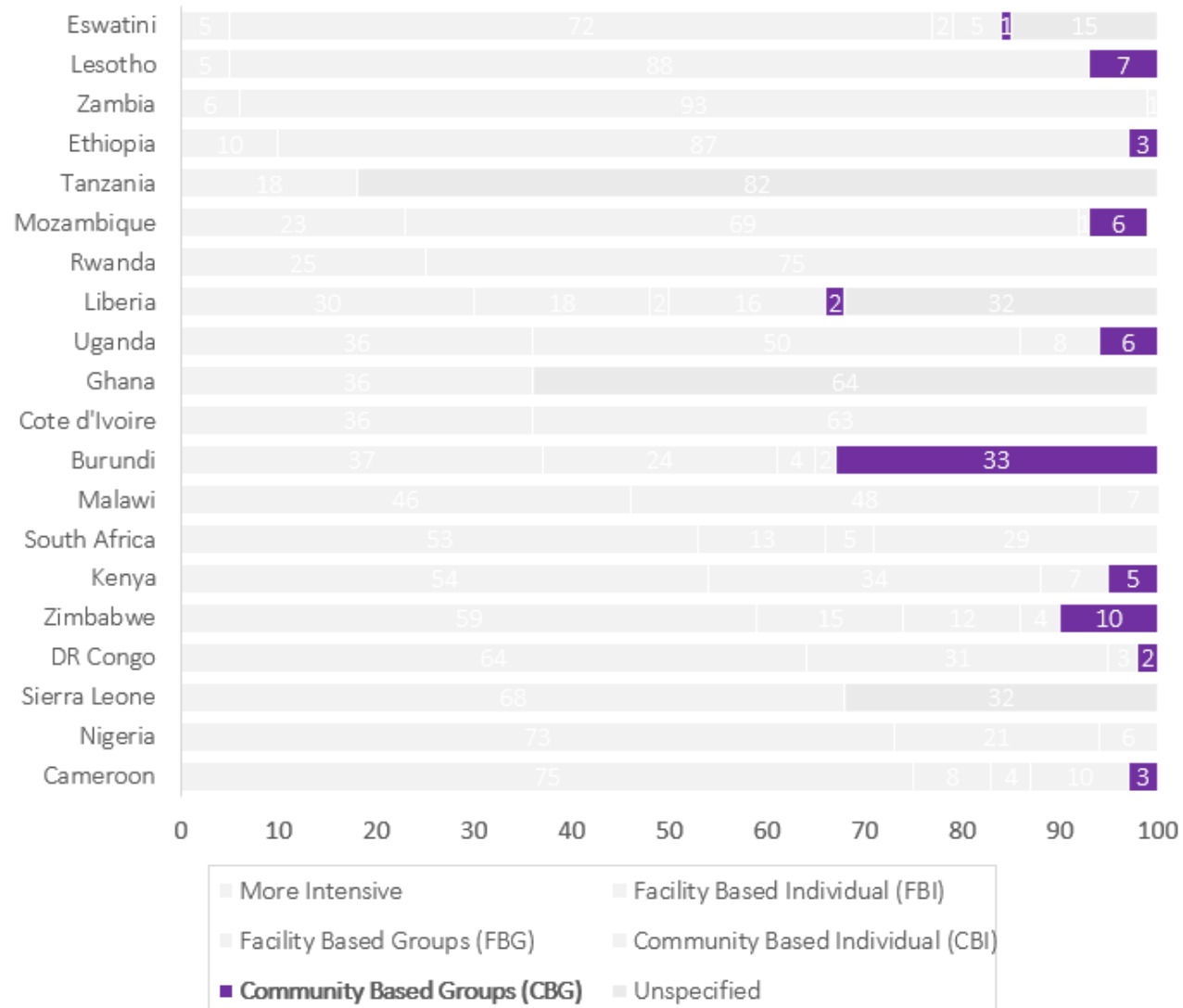

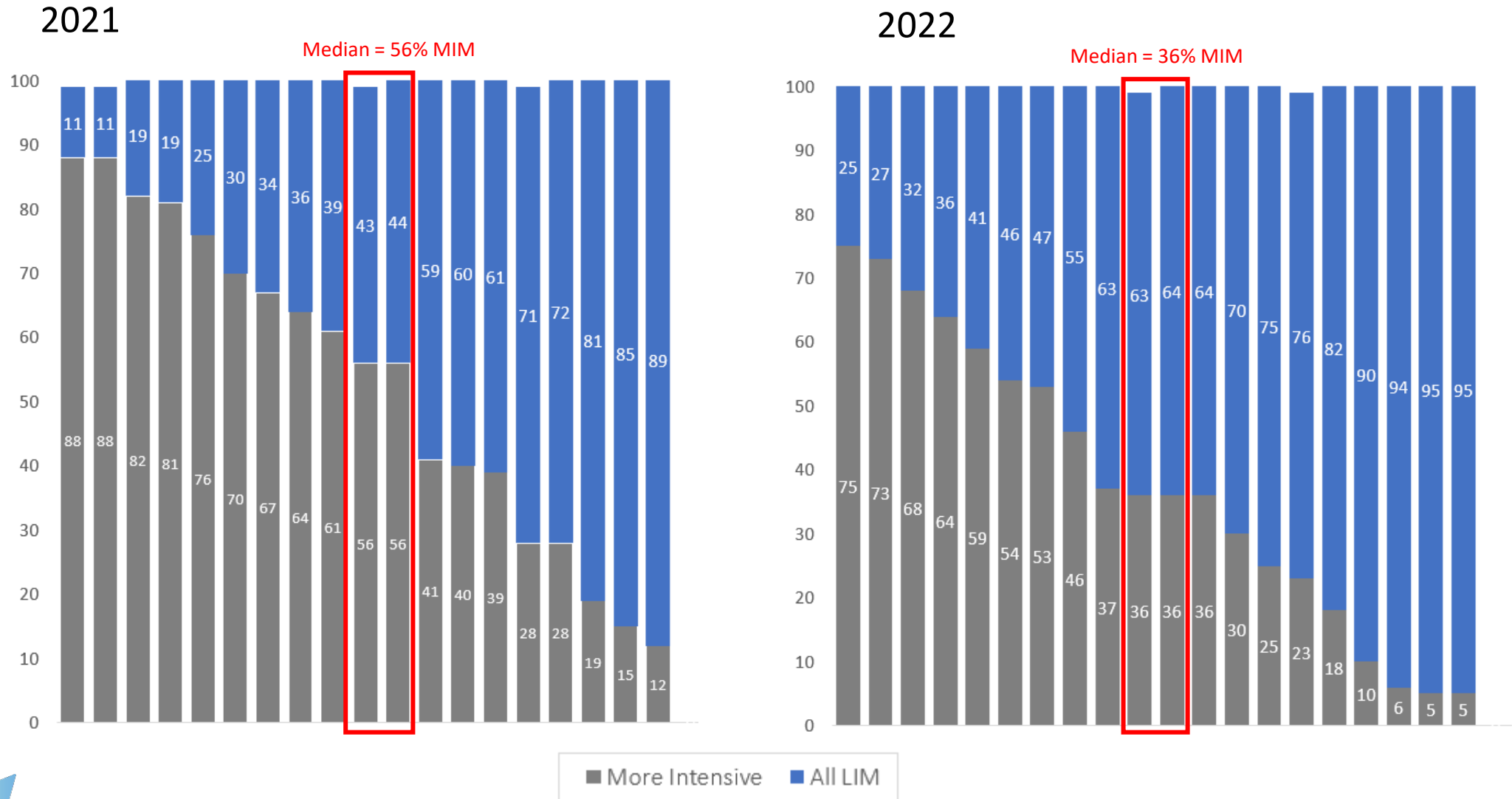

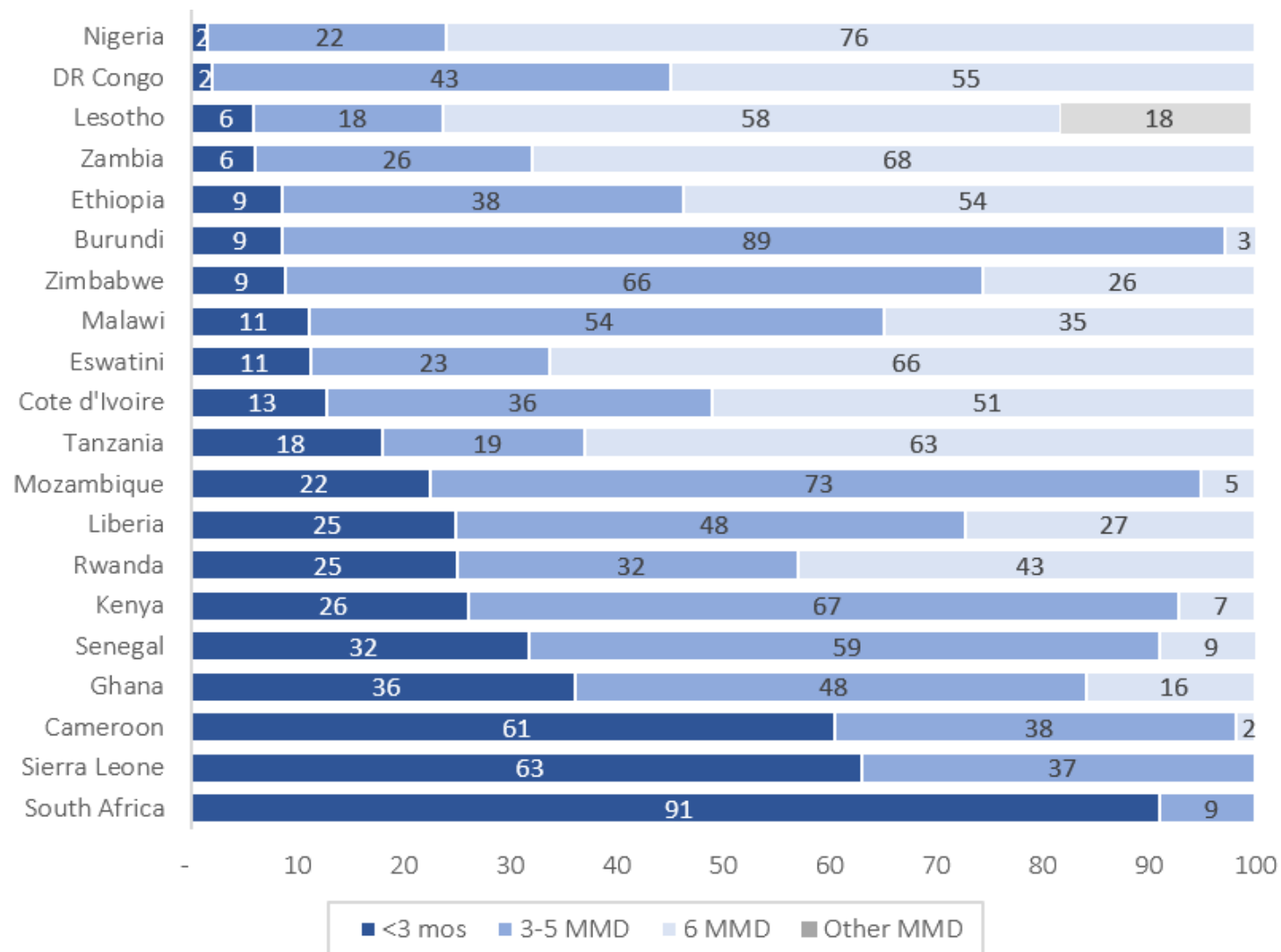

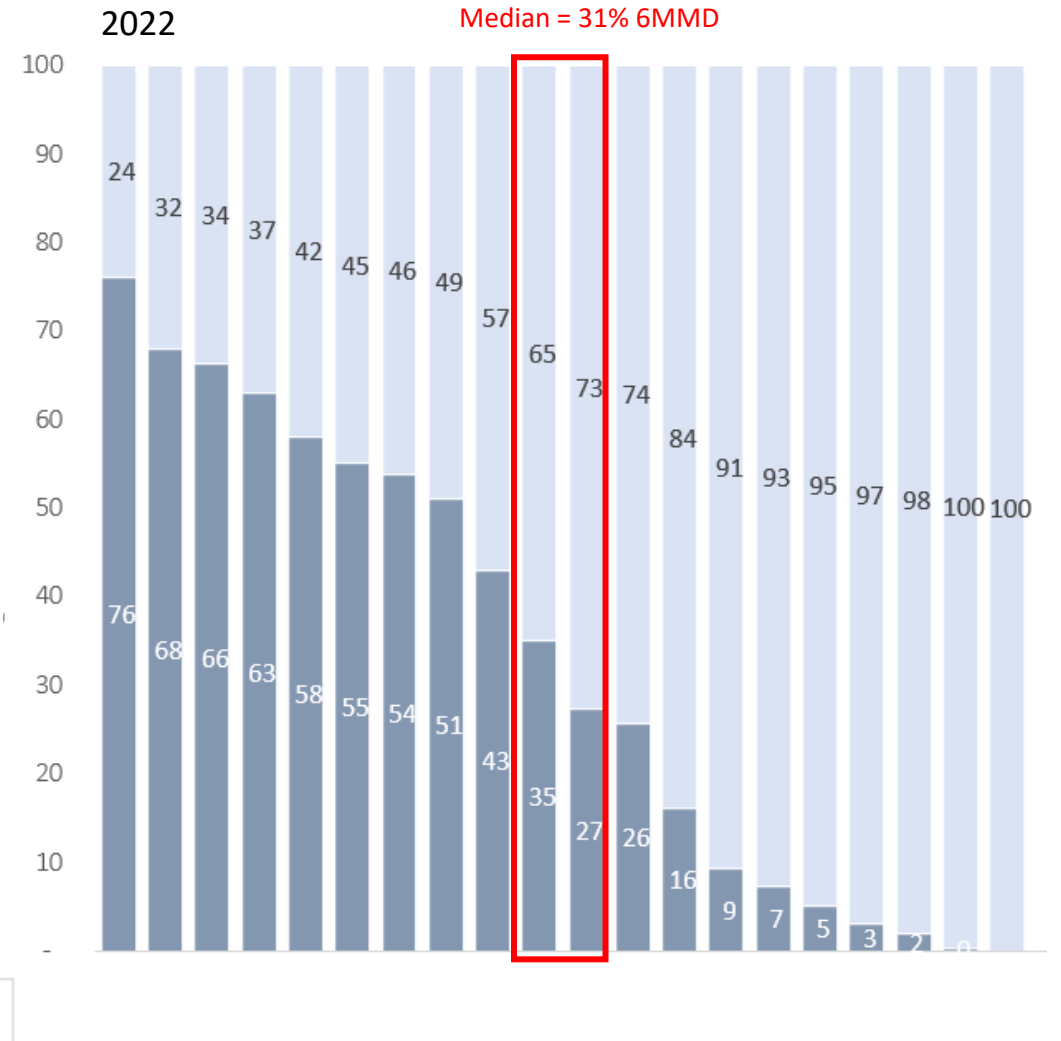
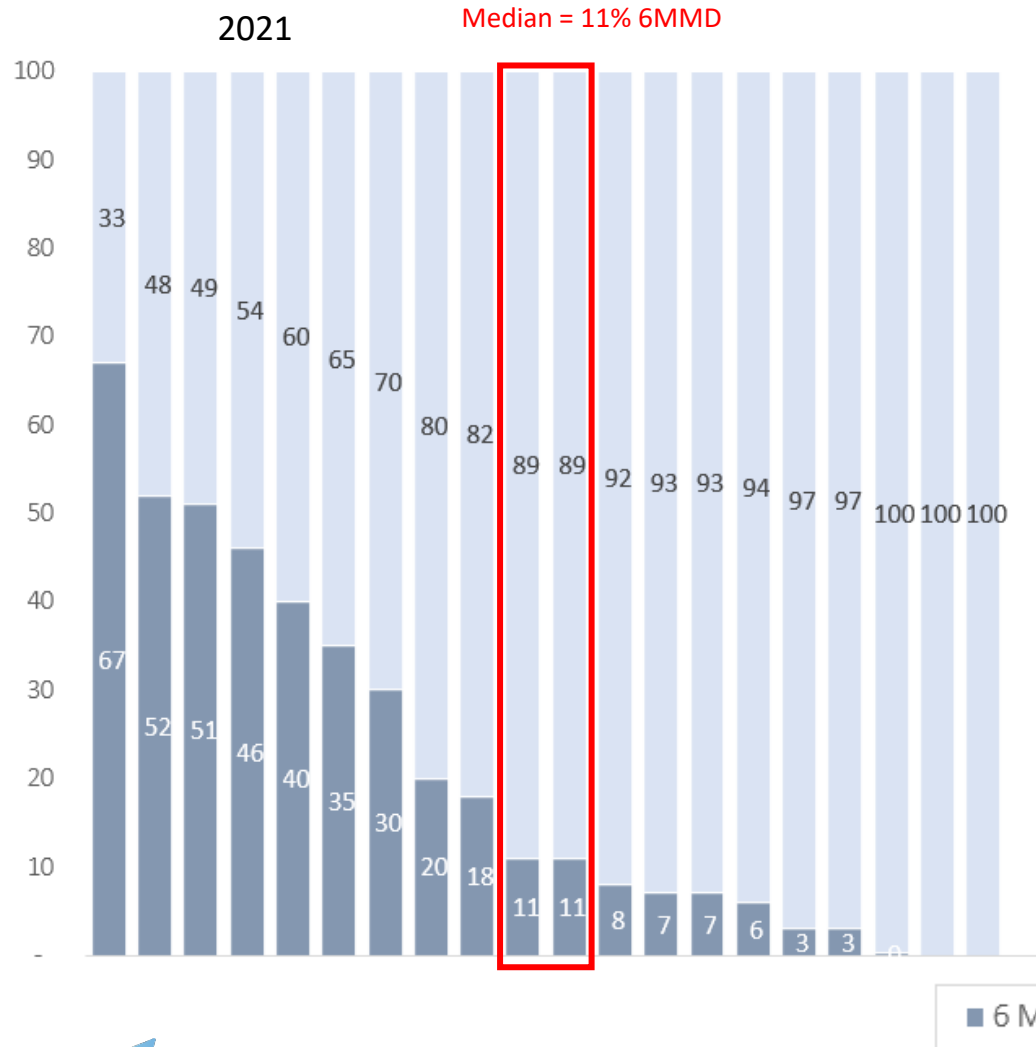
Model mix, more-intensive (MIM) vs. less-intensive (LIM) models, 2021-22

≥6MMD vs. < 6 MMD, 2021-22

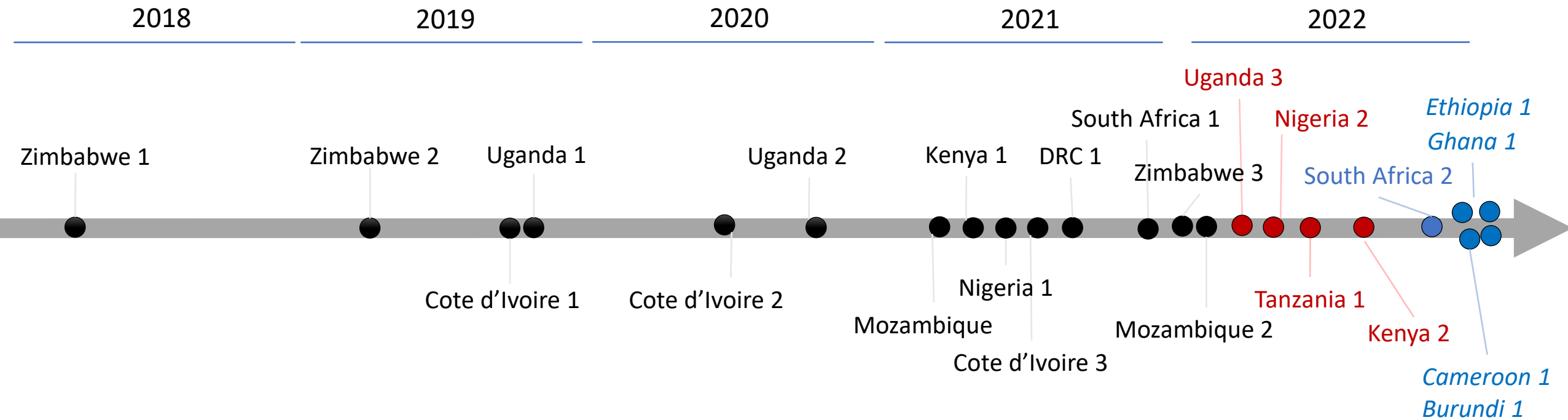


CQUIN DSD Performance Reviews (DPRs)

- ✓ Designed to fill the gaps in country M&E of DSD
- ✓ Standalone process of accessing data in facility-held records
- ✓ Data abstraction conducted in a sample of facilities
- ✓ Data is analyzed and shared in a dissemination meeting
- ✓ Stakeholders develop action plans based on results
- ✓ Process repeated ~ yearly



Timeline of DSD performance reviews



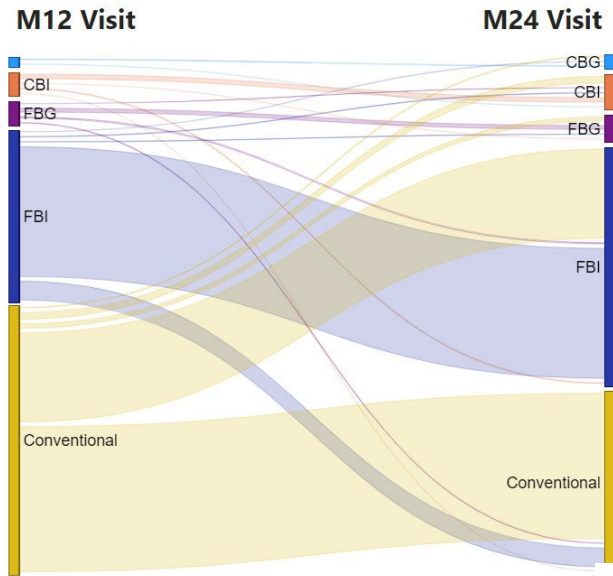
Black: Data collection and dissemination meetings completed

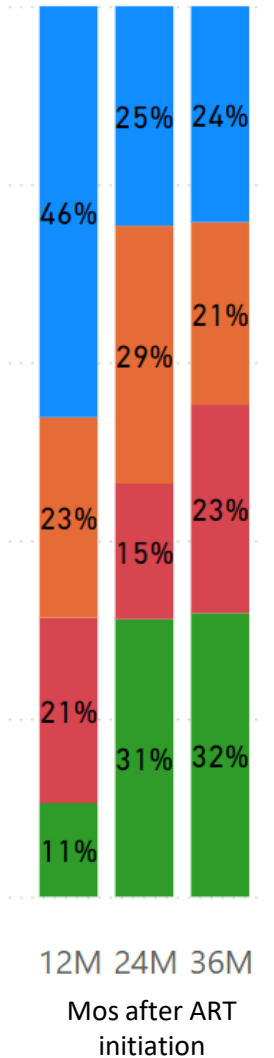
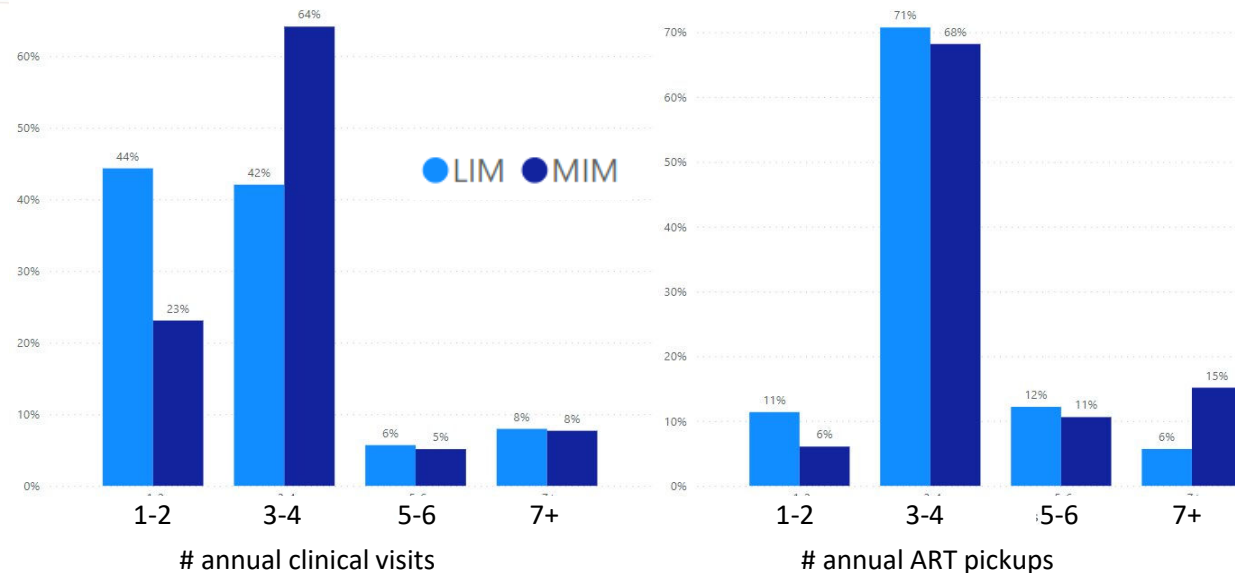
1) Model engagement and model switch across time



2) Appropriateness of model engagement vs. guidelines

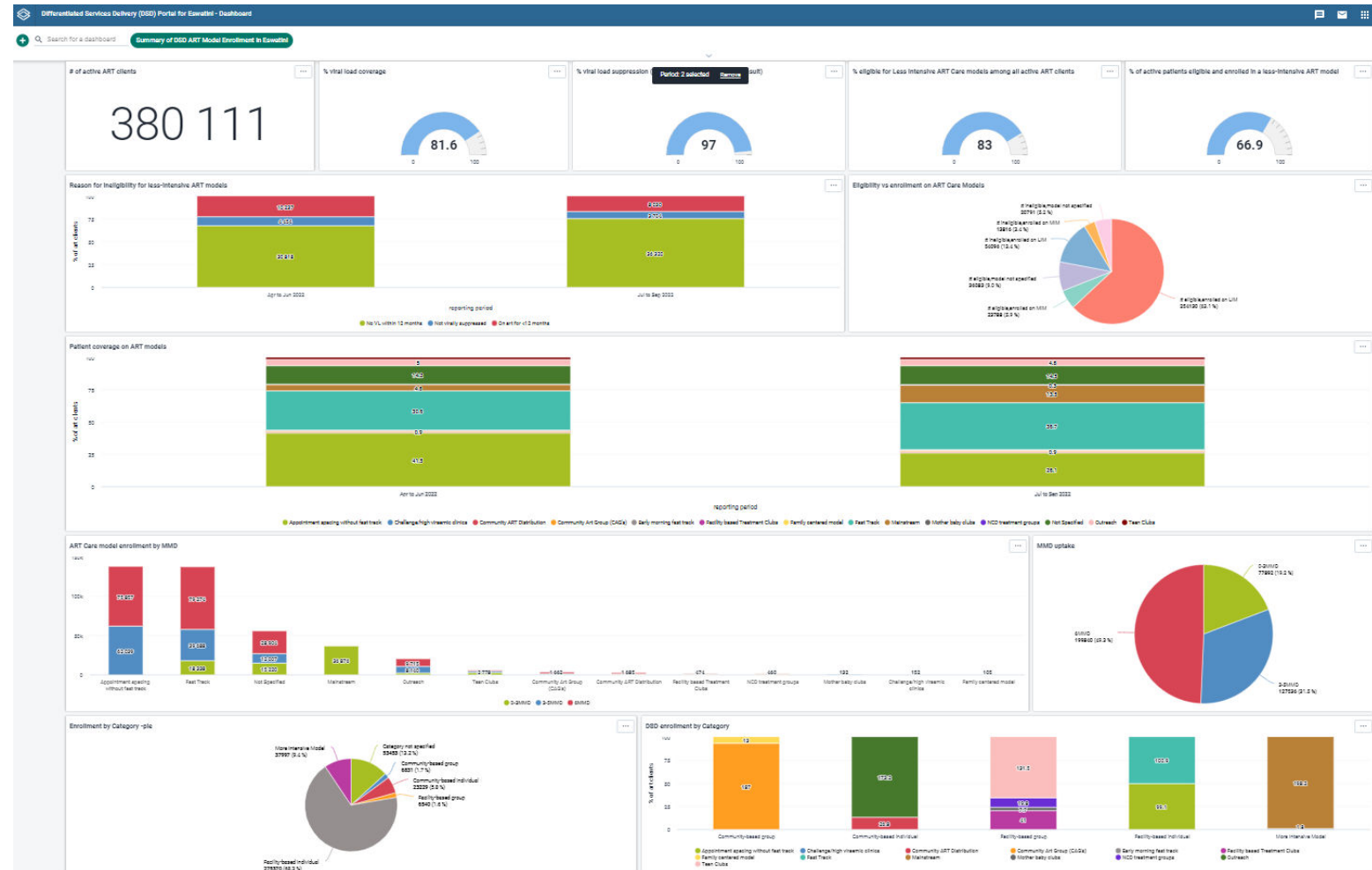

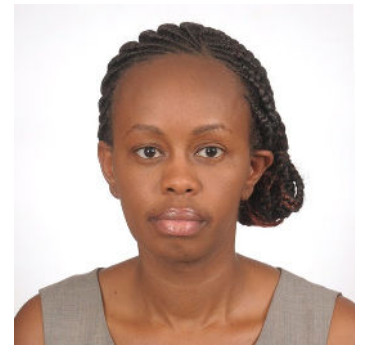

Looking Back: Launch of CQUIN 1.0 in Durban, March 2017

- Where was **DSD** in 2017?
 - Focus on less-intensive models for people doing well on treatment (“stable clients”)
 - Emerging evidence base
 - Largely (but not entirely) pilot projects
- Where was the **CQUIN** network in 2017?
 - Just launched
 - 6 countries
 - The first capability maturity model self-staging exercises highlighted multiple barriers to scale

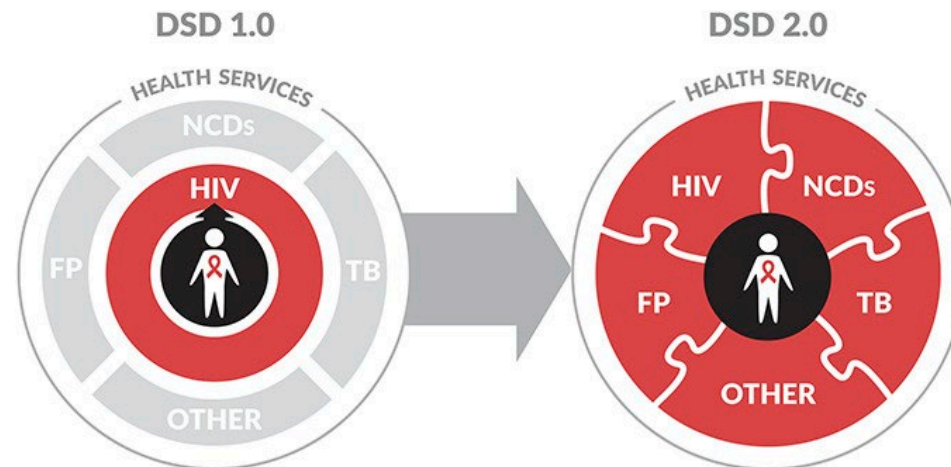
What has changed?

- Markedly increased coverage of differentiated ART for people established on treatment, driven by:
 - Changing national policies and guidelines
 - Growing evidence base
 - Recipient of care advocacy
 - COVID-19 pandemic
- Increasing recognition of the importance of DSD for other contexts:
 - Key and priority populations
 - People with AHD and/or at high risk of disease progression
 - People with co-morbidities and NCDs
 - Differentiated testing and linkage
- Continuing push for integrated, person-centered care

What's next?

CQUIN 2.0!

- The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation has extended the CQUIN project through June 2027
- Focus will expand to include differentiated service delivery along the HIV cascade and the integration of non-HIV services into DSD models (DSD 2.0)
- We look forward to working with you for another 5 years!
